4-H - Positive Youth Development

Holly Luerssen, 4-H Program Educator Jasmine Carbajal, 4-H Associate Educator

- A bi-weekly email newsletter for 4-H families where they learn about local, state, and national program
 opportunities and project resources. This effort is designed to increase communication while efficiently utilizing
 resources.
- A training for teens and adults serving on the North Central Regional 4-H Camp leadership team, where
 participants to developed skills in working with children and learned how to be role models, positively impacting
 children, lead and be challenged, and learn 4-H Camp traditions.
- A workshop for 4-H Project members where they learned and practiced creativity in a hands-on egg decorating
 project that was designed to engage the youth and develop a spark for art and build a sense of belonging in 4-H.
- Collaborative planning for summer camp where colleagues from seven counties work to create a positive overnight experience for campers (grades 4-7) and camp counselors (grades 9+.)

Agriculture

Heather Schlesser, Dairy Agent

- Planning for the Agriculture Education area at 2022 Wisconsin Farm Technology Days, an outdoor trade show for farmers and rural communities to increase knowledge of Extension Agriculture programs in crops and soils, dairy, farm management, livestock, and horticulture.
- A farm field day where dairy producers viewed a robotic milking system and interacted with the owner to learn
 more about this innovative system, the data the robots generate, and how the data can be used to manage the
 dairy herd more profitably
- Planning the 2022 Spring Emergency Livestock Transport Response (PELTR) hybrid course to increase economic sustainability of a local area's emergency plan for roadside incidents involving livestock trailers.
- A webinar for dairy owners/operators, managers, employees, custom heifer raisers, and service providers where
 they learned the impact of a heifer's maturity at time of breeding and calving on her first-lactation performance
 and how to properly maintain the correct rate of gain in bred heifers so heifers will improve productivity and
 profitability.



- A webinar series (Farm Management Fridays) for over 100 farmers, agriculture service professionals, and
 educators, to explore the challenges and opportunities associated with a succession of the farm business for the
 purpose of increasing awareness of research and resources for beginning the conversation, identifying what
 factors might impede on the transfer of management to a successor, and creating a timeline for when and how
 management could change hands.
- Planning for presentations (Badger Dairy Insights Webinar Series) for dairy farmers, calf managers, feeds, dairy
 replacement managers, nutritionists, veterinarians, consultants, etc. where they will learn about feed efficiency,
 use of alternative forages, and breeding based on weight related to calf and heifer management. The effort is
 designed to increase productivity, profitability, and efficiency when raising dairy herd replacements.

FoodWIse

Tammy Hansen, FoodWlse Coordinator Gaonou Thao, FoodWlse Educator

- A facilitated meeting for food pantries, local non-profits, and social service organizations, where connections were made to better serve recent Afghan immigrants with food resources, with the goal of providing a coordinated response to food resource needs of immigrant populations.
- Monthly nutrition/food demo series for Hmong women participating in a domestic abuse support group where
 participants taste new foods and learn healthy ways to prepare them. The purpose of this program is to improve
 the quality of their families' diet and increase their ability to manage their food resources.
- Monthly nutrition/food demonstration for adults with limited incomes where participants learn to improve the
 quality of their families' diet and increase their ability to manage their food resources. The goal of the lessons is
 for participants to increase eating more fruits, vegetables and whole grains and increase their willingness to try or
 prepare new foods.
- Shared leadership and support to the Marathon County Hunger Coalition, where new food distribution strategies were discussed, along with upcoming coalition events, and potential new projects and partnerships that will empower Marathon County families through education and shared resources. The coalition's goal is to increase access to healthy foods in order to achieve health equity for all county residents.

Horticulture

Janell Wehr, Horticulture Educator

Romaine Calm and Garden On is a 12-session gardening series, designed to give beginning gardeners on a budget the skills they need to *successfully grow fresh vegetables*. Experienced gardeners will also gain new perspectives to add to their toolkit of knowledge.

Participants will learn how to:

- Choose appropriate garden crops and cultivated varieties
- Plan a garden
- Improve soil health including composting and fertilizing
- Planting techniques
- Insect, disease, weed, and wildlife management techniques



Find and use university research-based resources

Classes are free but registration is required. Classes will be held online via Zoom. Romaine Calm and Garden On is offered through collaboration with Marathon County Public Library. Classes will be held the first and third Wednesday of every month, March 2 – Sept. 21. Each session will be offered at 10 a.m. and again at 6 p.m. Learn more about the course or register here https://marathon.extension.wisc.edu/2022/02/16/learn-to-garden/ This course will increase awareness and knowledge of resources to address environmental contamination due to overuse of horticulture chemicals in suburban environments.

Additional Highlights

- Planning for a multi county educational program series for community gardeners. The goal of this effort is to increase gardeners' knowledge, promote best gardening practices and provide university-based resources to community gardeners, which improves the health and productivity of their garden plots.
- A virtual and in-person weekly educational series (Extension Wellness) for Central WI residents where participants learn a variety of topics to improve overall well-being and health. The purpose of this series is to increase overall well-being and health of residents through programs on financial, nutrition, horticulture, and behavioral health education.
- A class for participants aged 55+, where participants learned about using IPM based gardening techniques so that horticulture product misuse will decrease as participants' well-being increases through successful gardening.
- A social media outreach campaign for consumer gardeners in Wisconsin, where Facebook and Instagram users
 engaged with Extension resources, including the UW-Madison Extension Horticulture Topic Hub publications and
 YouTube videos. This effort is designed to increase awareness and knowledge of resources to address
 environmental contamination and pollution (due to overuse of horticulture chemicals in urban and suburban
 environments).
- An interactive web-based class for novice gardeners with limited resources, where participants learned about soil
 texture, pH and nutrient availability, benefits of adding compost to garden beds and how plant primary nutrients
 support plant growth. This effort is designed to increase awareness and knowledge of resources to address
 environmental contamination and pollution (due to overuse of horticulture chemicals in urban and suburban
 environments.
- An interactive web-based class for novice gardeners with limited resources, where participants learned to
 distinguish vegetable classification by plant family, define crop rotation as it applies to IPM, and apply crop
 rotation to planting maps. This effort is designed to increase awareness and knowledge of resources to address
 environmental contamination and pollution (due to overuse of horticulture chemicals in urban and suburban
 environments.
- An interview for WAOW's television audience where viewers learned dormant pruning techniques. This effort is
 designed to increase awareness and knowledge of resources to address environmental contamination and
 pollution (due to overuse of horticulture chemicals in urban and suburban environments).

Athens Potential New Building Update

Trustee Gary Beastrom and I had the opportunity to do a walkthrough of the potential new Athens Municipal building (currently a former US Bank building), to help determine whether the move is viable for the library. Upon initial review and with proposed renovations, the space allocated for the library seems amenable to our needs. It includes a large main space, sectioned off programming/children's area, study room, storage space and dedicated staff area. Fundraising is ongoing. Plans are in the works to have the space available for the Board to view at our June board meeting scheduled to be held in Athens.

Art Ledges Installed

As you may have seen, the art ledges arrived and have been installed on the second floor in the computer lab area. This space now houses all of our circulating art collection for patrons to view and check out. Each piece in the gallery can be borrowed for 56 days, with the option to renew for longer. Checkout must be done in-person at MCPL Wausau.



Friends and Foundation Aquarium Support

At their March board meetings, both the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation have agreed to increase their aquarium support pledge from \$3,500 to \$4,000 each per year. The Friends of the Library also gave a one-time donation of an additional \$2,000 to help with the overages that have been accumulating on our aquarium budget line as costs have increased.

MCPL Launches "Little Art"

Last month, the Marathon County Public Library launched its traveling Little Art Exhibit to the public. The exhibit debuted at MCPL Wausau on February 1, where it remained on display on the library's first floor until the end of the month. The exhibit was then sent to MCPL's Rothschild Branch, where it will reside for the next few weeks.

The exhibit is composed of 12 works created by children, teens and adults using Grab & Go kits that were given out at all nine MCPL locations in November 2021. Each kit contained two small pieces of glossy white cardstock, acrylic paints in a variety of colors, a paintbrush and assorted other craft supplies, including ribbon, pompoms and feathers.

Patrons were then tasked with creating a mixed media work of art using the given materials, and additional supplies of their own. No other prompts or directions were given, meaning it was up to patrons to supply their own inspiration. Patrons were asked to return their completed pieces to the library in December and January, where they were then mounted on a display board for viewing.

The exhibit will tour all nine MCPL locations between now and the beginning of August, when it makes its final stop at MCPL's Stratford Branch. The remainder of the exhibit tour schedule is as follows:




Youth Services

In March, the youth services team was busy with partnerships and preparation! The youth services department hosted the Wausau School District 2022 Art Cluster display for the entire month. The art drew a lot of patrons in who do not use the library and prompted library card sign-ups and renewing expired library cards. Elizabeth did STEAM focused outreach at several schools with the G2M program and Rose collaborated with the Woodson Art Museum on another exhibit-related story time. LENA was in full swing and we are currently serving about 30 families. Taylor was busy coordinating LENA device swaps and facilitating a class with Rose. The team met to discuss safe activities to put out in the ELC with guidance from the Health Department. We also figured out logistics for our outdoor story times, made a story time schedule, and ordered supplies for our various outdoor and grab and go programs this summer. We are very excited to do more in-person programming this spring and summer, and do it safely!


100 Books Before Graduation

A new reading challenge called 100 Books Before Graduation is available for teens on Beanstack. The challenge encourages current high school students to read widely before college. Participants log books read and earn rewards at 20, 50, 70, and 100 book milestones, including a book bag, free books, and a gift card for completing the challenge. This is an ongoing challenge available through the reading tracker app Beanstack that patrons can join at any time.



Homebound Outreach

MCPL Homebound program staff visited Copper Leaf Assisted Living in Schofield. There, they presented information about the Homebound outreach program and other services that MCPL has to offer and led the group through art activities, trivia and singing.



For Marathon County residents unable to visit the library due to age, illness, accident or disability, our Homebound program offers a way to receive library materials at home by mail or special delivery. Once enrolled, library volunteers will select materials for you based on your preferences and send these items to your residence on a regular schedule. Items are checked out for five weeks and may be returned by mail or courier.

Branches

Grab and Go craft kits continue to be popular at all locations. In March, we collectively handed out 308 quilled monster magnet craft kits for kids and 176 silk sari bracelet craft kits for adults. Virtual book club continues to meet at many locations; patrons and library staff alike are both gearing up for outside book club restarting when the weather is warmer. Creative displays were featured at all locations including ones for Women's History Month, the March Madness basketball tournament, "March in to a new series...," and a read-a-like display for Disney's *Encanto*.

In Rothschild, 20 children and their stuffed animal friends participated in the branch's 2nd Stuffed Animal Sleepover. The children couldn't believe what their animal friends got up to when locked in the library overnight! Photos can be found on our social media page.

Stratford's Virtual Story Time about Trains was featured on the library's social media on March 29. Darla and MJ are great train engineers in this fun story time!

- ☐ Local/Regional/State/National Grants. The University and our committed staff are continuously looking for additional funding opportunities to support their work and to benefit the communities they serve.





- MCDEVCO was at the CWMA Expo on April 28, 2022 advertising its business incubation space at the Entrepreneurial & Education Center (EEC), educational programs and GAP loan fund opportunities.
- MCDEVCO will be at the Greater Wausau Chamber Expo on May 12, 2022.
- MCDEVCO has conducted private information sessions with various financial institutions to
 educate them on the GAP loan process so funds are utilized in the immediate future to support
 economic growth and development for new or expanding businesses in Marathon County.
- MCDEVCO has had continuous conversations with developers and builders regarding upcoming business developments.
