V. Resech presented on behalf of MCDEVCO sharing their beliefs and mission and how they can be the leading entity on this project. Discussion was held on our relationship with MCDEVCO and how we can define strategies to lead and expand this initiative.

- J. Robinson asked for a motion to approve this "proposed criteria in concept." E. Budleski made a motion, seconded by S. Guild with point of clarification to make sure to obtain the Task Force's feedback and complete a final review.

A. Fiber Projects

G. Klein and N. Harder reported on several fiber projects. The Fiber projects will provide broadband access for the new city water facility to the Wausau Community Area Network connection at Northcentral Technical College, as well as, expand access to the Rothschild Elementary School, Riverside School, Rothschild Fire Station, Rothschild Police Department and the Marathon County Library at Rothschild.

B. Tower Infrastructure Projects

N. Harder researched and reported on equipment costs for two (2) different tower models, with a cost of \$36,000 and \$32,000 respectively. These are 20, 40 and 60 foot towers. He is waiting for installation cost estimates.

7. Routes to Recovery Fund Use

A. Existing Tower Use

The County's west wayside tower can accommodate wireless internet service providers but not cellular services.

B. Update on Libraries and Polling Locations as Wi-Fi hotspots

G. Klein reported that the access points at Hatley and Athens libraries are being evaluated for moving them outside to support free Wi-Fi in the parking areas.

C. Other Potential Projects

G. Klein reported that he is researching the possibility of partnering with a cellular provider to improve services in the Little Chicago area.

8. Public Service Commission Grant Opportunity

The PSC grant program is currently accepting applications. Marathon County continues to look for opportunities to pursue partnerships and is open to new ideas. Northwoods Connect had indicated that they are a willing partner. J. Robinson stated that the task force has about a month to decide how to move forward.

PROPOSED CRITERIA FOR EVALUATING BROADBAND PROJECTS IN MARATHON COUNTY

(October 22, 2020)

Definitions:

"Broadband service" means a communications service providing to end users, at a minimum, two-way data transmission with speeds of at least 50 mbps for download transmission and 10 mbps for upload transmission, but does not include a commercial mobile radio service or a broadband service in which a stand-alone satellite provider connects directly to the end user with a satellite connection.

"Scalable" means, with respect to a project for a broadband network, that the broadband network has the ability to maintain the quality of its service while increasing parameters relating to the size of the network, such as the number of users, the number of network nodes, the number of services provided, or the network's geographic spread.

"Underserved" means served by fewer than 2 broadband service providers.

"Unserved area" means an area of this state that is not served by an Internet service provider offering Internet service that is all of the following:

- 1. Fixed wireless service or wired service.
- **2.** Provided at actual speeds of at least 20 percent of the upload and download speeds for advanced telecommunications capability as designated by the federal communications commission in its inquiries regarding advanced telecommunications capability under <u>47 USC</u> <u>1302</u> (b).

The intent of this program is to expand broadband access to areas that are not currently served by at least two providers meeting the service delivery speeds outlined above. Projects must demonstrate a clear and achievable plan to improve broadband communications services in one or more unserved or underserved areas in the county.

The criteria shall give priority to projects that:

- include matching funds,
- that involve public-private partnerships,
- that affect unserved or underserved areas,
- that are scalable.
- that promote economic development,
- that will not result in delaying the provision of broadband service to areas neighboring areas to be served by the proposed project, or that affect a large geographic area or a large number of unserved or underserved individuals or communities,
- projects which address unserved or underserved areas in the towns north of Hwy 29 will be given priority when allocating county funds

The criteria shall prohibit grants that have the effect of subsidizing the expenses of a provider of telecommunications service, or the monthly bills of customers of those providers

When evaluating grant applications under this section, the county shall consider:

- the degree to which the proposed projects would not duplicate existing broadband infrastructure, information about the presence of which is provided by the applicant or another person within a time period designated by the county;
- the impacts of the proposed projects on the ability of individuals to access health care services from home and the cost of those services; and
- the impacts of the proposed projects on the ability of students to access educational opportunities from home; and
- the impacts of the proposed projects on the ability of individuals and businesses to access telework opportunities from home.


An explanation of how the proposed project will increase broadband access. Include information about the:

Potential and expected number of households served, including number of unserved and underserved locations.

- Potential and expected number of businesses served, including number of unserved and underserved locations.
- Expected number of seasonal residents and tourists served.
- Estimated download and upload speed of the broadband service packages available for purchase.
- A statement whether the proposed project is targeting the "last mile," "middle mile," or backbone portion of the broadband infrastructure.
- A description of the broadband service to be provided, including estimated download and upload speeds, whether the speed is based on dedicated or shared bandwidth, and the technology that will be used. This description may be illustrated by a map or schematic diagram, as appropriate.
- A description the area of the county that will be affected by the proposed project
- A schedule by which the applicant intends to complete the components of the proposed project. The project period is up to 24 months.
- A proposed budget for the proposed project, including the capital costs of the project and the expected revenue sources including contributions from partners.

Hey All,

Thanks again for the great conversation on Tuesday. As promised, we wanted to see what the coverage looked like for the areas that you identified, so we put a map together (attached) that should be a great kickoff to the deeper discussion. The actual tower locations are obviously TBD, but consider this a place to start. We've historically had the best luck finding sites owned by the county or a town as they understand the collaborative goal a bit

Anyway, as you'll see, the maps look decently impressive. We find they're about 75% accurate given any particular rooftop, but I went conservative in our approach so we aren't making unobtainable promises. These tower are all simulated at 300' and would require FAA approval. Most towers under 200' wouldn't have this hurdle, but coverage wouldn't be quite as ubiquitous (but probably still pretty good given the amount of open spaces in that region).

In a vacuum, we believe this is worth chasing. The obvious challenge is how do we make the numbers work. And given that we'd be expanding our footprint a county over, it wouldn't be worthwhile for us as a company to do this for 1 or 2 towers. Five towers would be ideal to hit the coverage you need, but the budget and matching funds might be a little tight in that scenario. It might come down to finding additional partners for matching funds, removing a tower, or dropping heights to below 200'. Either way, Northwoods Connect would be happy to add in a significant amount of our internal engineering and labor costs as matching funds to help make it happen.

We're all super sensitive to the amount of time we have left to get this done, so I'm happy to answer any questions to keep the ball rolling.

I don't have John's email so please pass this on to whomever you need to.

Attached is a .KMZ file of the plan we came up with. No sooner did I hang up the phone with you and John, my engineer got me the info and we changed paths slightly. We'll come South from Hatley down County Y to Townline road and also pick up down County Q to the south so we can get to the subdivision at Joe's road. All this can be seen on the map.

Our initial review is this: Build is 7.35 miles 83 homes are passed with Gigabit capable Fiber to the Home Initial full cost of the project \$360,150

If we grant at 52%/48% which the PSC likes to see: \$187,278 funding needed / Grant money to apply for = \$172,872

With our plate getting full for next year we'd have to see what portion of the \$187,278 the County would be willing to supply before we go ahead with the grant.

As I noted on the call, this will be engineered and built to set us up for future builds to the North on Q as well as to the South towards Plover River Rd and County I.

I hope this helps and as always let me know what questions you have for me.
