Call meeting to order – Meeting called to order by Chairman Schlei at 12:30pm, Rm 3, 212 River Dr., Wausau.

Public Comment Period – Not to Exceed 15 Minutes – none brought forward

Approve Minutes – **Motion** / second by Seefeldt / Bove to approve the minutes from the November 6, 2018 Forestry/Recreation Committee meeting. Motion **carried** by voice vote, no dissent.

Educational Presentations/Outcome Monitoring Reports

A. Results of the DNR/County Forest Partnership Meeting – Keranen reported that at the partnership meeting they discussed County forest time standards, County forest work plan, conservation aid projects, forest certification, land use issues, and forest health. It's a good partnership between the County and the DNR and he expects that to continue. Keranen gave history on how the partnership began. Seefeldt questioned if the hours that the DNR provides would be adjusted if the County bought more land. Lovlien said the hours wouldn't increase but that additional help wouldn't be needed even if more land is bought unless there would be a natural disaster where short term additional help may be required.

B. Fall 2018 Timber Sale Bid Results and Weighted Averages – Keranen summarized the October and November bid openings. Six of seven sale sold. The appraised value of the sales was \$288,901.50 and sold for \$222,496.55. The bulk of the wood sold is aspen and mixed hardwood pulp that goes to paper mills. Going into the 2019 spring bid opening staff will have discussions on how to appraise sales and adjustments may be made. The average per acre to the County was \$590.18. Lovlien explained that the DNR approved selling the additional two sales that were under advertised value. The market has taken a bit of a downturn but can turn around fast because of markets, weather, and contractor availability.

C. Purpose of Using Herbicides to Control Invasive Species and for Site Preparation on County Forests – Joe Tucker, County Forester – Tucker explained herbicides are used for invasive species where there are significant populations of buckthorn and honeysuckle along trails in some forest units. The other use is for site preparation when they are trying to regenerate oak or maple where there is competition from invasive species and also from undesirable native species. Tucker discussed the pros and cons of the different application methods including foliar, basal bark, girdle and spray, and handwick. He said some of the environmental concerns of herbicide application include runoff and drift. Alternative ways to control invasive plants and to help with site preparation include prescribed fire or mechanical means both of which may not be as cost effective. Bove had a concern if any of the chemicals being used had adverse effects on pollinators. Tucker said the applications are done during the dormant season. He discussed how long the active ingredients within the herbicide stays active. He said he could provide further information to Committee either on an annual basis or when future applications are needed. Keranen mentioned that the forest is third party certified and there is a list of pesticides that cannot be used. Stefanski said they were mostly spraying herbicides for plants and that insecticides are mostly used in agriculture to keep bugs off the plants. Keranen said in the future they may do some prescribed burns on the County forest.

Operational Functions Required by Statute, Ordinance or Resolution:

A. Discussion and Possible Action by Committee

1. Review and Consider Approving the 2019 County Forest Wildlife Work Plan – Brandon Stefanski, DNR Wildlife Biologist - The work plan had been previously distributed. Stefanski introduced Paul Napierala as the new wildlife technician who will assist in getting field work done. Stefanski reported on accomplishments from 2018. He discussed 2019 plans including flowage maintenance, wild rice seeding, alder and invasive species management, forest opening maintenance and the Nickel-an-Acre budget. Questions were answered.

2. Review and Consider Approving the 2019 Work Plan – Resolution to Approve the 2019 Annual County Forester Work Plan - Lovlien reviewed the work plan. He gave highlights on upcoming work including timber management, research projects, road maintenance, conservation aids projects, administration, GIS work and professional development. He is interested in providing a County forest tour to the Committee members as well as any interested County Board members. **Motion** / second by Schlei / Bove to approve the 2019 Annual County Forest Work Plan along with the Wildlife Plan and forward it along with the resolution to the Environmental Resource Committee for consideration. Motion **carried** by voice vote, no dissent.

3. Resolution: Application for County Forest Acreage Payment - Lovlien said if approved this interest free loan can be used for land acquisition, capital equipment and forest maintenance and development. The loan is paid back through a 20% severance tax on timber. **Motion** / second by Seefeldt / Bove to approve the Application for County Forest Acreage Share Loan Payment resolution and forward it to the Environmental Resource Committee for their approval. Motion **carried** by voice vote, no dissent.

4. 2019 Forestry/Recreation Committee Tentative Meeting Schedule  
Consensus was to keep the meetings at 12:30 pm on the first Tuesdays of every month.

5. Consider Timber Bids and Award Contracts – Rodney Hix Forest Products – Lovlien reported that Rodney Hix Forest Products purchased one of the two remaining sales. After two bid openings the County is allowed to sell remaining sales at the value the County appraises them at. Hix has agreed to pay that price. He has worked on County forests in the past. Lovlien recommends that Committee enter into a contract with Hix Forest Products on tract 10-18. **Motion** / second by Seefeldt / Schlei to approve the contract with Rodney Hix Forest Products on tract 10-18. Motion **carried** by voice vote, no dissent.

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The following is my report on county forest law enforcement activity from last year. I have listed each event in order by date of occurrence.

1. March 26, 2018 @ Ringle Forest; (1) tree stand seized.
2. March 27, 2018 @ Kronenwetter Forest; (1) tree stand seized.
3. April 24, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (1) tree stand seized.
4. May 17, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (1) citation issued to a 57 year old male for using a tree stand in an unauthorized manner. This stand was seized on April 24<sup>th</sup> and returned to him on August 30<sup>th</sup> upon payment of the fine.
5. June 14, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (2) tree stands seized.
6. August 2, 2018 @ Nine Mile Forest; (1) citation issued to a 60 year old male for using a facility without paying the established fee. He had been riding a mountain bike on the developed trails without purchasing a trail pass.
7. September 17, 2018 @ Nine Mile Forest; (1) citation issued to a 22 year old male for defacing trees or other natural growth. He acknowledged cutting down two young spruce trees with a machete at the informal camp site north of the Chalet parking area.
8. October 2, 2018 @ Kronenwetter Forest; (1) citation issued to a 22 year old male for cutting natural growth. He acknowledged cutting down two red oaks and one big tooth aspen for firewood south of the Martin Road parking area.
9. October 31, 2018 @ Kronenwetter Forest; (1) tree stand, (1) trail camera and (1) game cart seized.
10. November 14, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (2) tree stands and (1) trail camera seized.
11. November 15, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (2) tree stands seized.
12. November 30, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (1) tree stand seized.
13. December 12, 2018 @ Leather Camp Forest; (1) tree stand seized.
14. December 20, 2018 @ Wisconsin River Forest; (1) citation issued to a 68 year old male for cutting natural growth. He acknowledged cutting down three trees and bending over vegetation in front of his ground blind north of Pine Bluff Road.

Orange signs were placed on each tree from which a stand was seized. This sign references the county ordinance and provides a phone number if the owner wants to claim their stand.
